Introduction to the Project

MAKE with the Knit Shop is an ambitious new teacher development project supported by the Paul Hamlyn Foundation Teacher Development Fund which will run from August 2023 to December 2025.

Over two years, the project will work with six primary schools in Dundee to introduce new craft-based approaches to apply numeracy skills through textile activities.

The project is aimed at teachers of primary 5-6 and aims to equip teachers with the skills, knowledge, confidence and experience to deliver effective arts-based teaching and will introduce different approaches to consolidate learning using the Dundee Progression Pathways for Numeracy.

During this ambitious new CLPL (Career Long Professional Learning) project teachers will attend a residency at the Knit Shop, an independent knit factory in Dundee, owned by award-winning Scottish textile and product designer Donna Wilson, and have the opportunity to visit the studios of three independent textile makers, each working with a different textile expertise. They will also be able to involve their classes in an introductory workshop and have access to practical guides, films, and resource packs to encourage exploration of traditional and contemporary craft processes. These may include an introduction to textile practice and approaches to de-colonising its history in Dundee; an understanding of materials and their connection to place and to the natural world, and an understanding of the circular economy, sustainability and textiles.

The Project Partners are 6 x participating primary schools, Knit Shop, Dundee Creative Learning Network, and the MAKE Learn partners - Panel and Craft Scotland. Teachers and makers will collaborate on the development, delivery and evaluation of the project. CLPL activity will be developed with the expertise of the Knit Shop. Creative Dundee Learning Network brings expertise and knowledge from the education sector and will contribute to the development of evaluation methodologies.

The Project Leads are Craft Scotland and Panel who collaborate on the MAKE Learn project. The Project Leads will oversee reporting to partners and funders, line manage freelancers, manage all financial decision-making, have an overview of risk management, and lead on advocacy and communications.



Funder Expectations and Support

The purpose of the Paul Hamlyn Foundation Teacher Development Fund (TDF) is to support the delivery of effective arts-based teaching and learning opportunities in the primary classroom and to embed learning through the arts in the curriculum. It aims to do this through supporting teachers and school leaders to develop the necessary skills, knowledge, confidence and experience. MAKE with the Knit Shop will be part of the TDF Cohort Learning Programme which enables current thinking to be shared between active TDF projects, TDF alumni and external experts. This is a crucial part of the project and everyone will contribute to a growing body of knowledge about artsbased teacher CPDL, and about how arts-based approaches support pupils in overcoming barriers to learning. The project is also supported by Creative Scotland through targeted funds.

Others Involved

Over the course of the project we will work with Public Image PR who are responsible for public communications and press related to the project and wider MAKE Learn advocacy. Freelance makers will collaborate closely with teachers to plan and deliver craft activities and support a cascaded learning approach in the schools.

We are recruiting a second freelance post to support the coordination and delivery of the project.

About the Role

The MAKE Teacher Liaison will work closely with the MAKE Project Coordinator (freelance) to ensure the project is delivered effectively over the two-year duration. This is a crucial role in ensuring the success of the project as you will act as the main liaison between selected schools in Dundee and the project partners.

Key responsibilities will include supporting the participating teachers and school leaders in the planning, delivery and evaluation of project activities, supporting the planning and delivery of the teacher residency at the Knit Shop and providing support for makers (with the Knit Shop) when working in or with the schools.



The MAKE Teacher Liaison will be responsible for shaping and implementing project evaluation and contributing to reporting and assessment for funders and partners. An important aspect of the role will be liaising with teachers and school leaders to support embedded learning and ensure a cascaded approach can be achieved in each school, which is a key objective for the project.

We are looking for an individual with experience in delivering hybrid education and learning activities for children, schools and /or CLPL for teachers and educators.

The project will begin in the Autumn Term, with activities across all school terms in Year One (2023-2024) and Year Two (2024-2025).

The MAKE Teacher Liaison will report to Craft Scotland's Director and will work closely with Panel on specific aspects of the project. We will require the Teacher Liaison to work in person with schools and the Knit Shop as well as attending funder and Project Lead meetings. You will be expected to attend up to four online meetings each year with the Paul Hamlyn Foundation and up to two in-person Cohort meetings.

Expectations

- You will be skilled in building and maintaining relationships across different partnerships and in different contexts and able to work effectively on your own to support this.
- You will attend in-person and online meetings with the Paul Hamlyn Foundation as required.
- You will work in person with schools and the Knit Shop as well as attending Project lead meetings.
- You will understand the schools' needs when working with external personnel (e.g. makers, PR and press).
- You will proactively support Equalities, Diversity and Inclusion across the project.



Key Responsibilities

- Liaise with schools to support teachers' residency, classroom activity, class visits outside of school, reporting within schools.
- With Craft Scotland, Paul Hamlyn Foundation, Dundee Creative Learning Network and Senior School Leaders devise key measurables and framework for evaluation and reporting.
- Generate and facilitate the planning and reflection workshops and ensure evaluation will enable project partners to measure impact.
- Manage the development and sourcing of materials and resources; taking into consideration the future sustainability of the project.
- Coordinate classroom activity with the Knit Shop and the commissioned makers and support makers in planning and delivering workshops and CLPL activity.
- Scheduling and leading meetings with teachers via Teams and in person.
- With makers and teachers, devise digital resources and MAKE resource packs for schools.
- Support future legacy of the project, including teachers' subsequent in-class delivery and collaboration with colleagues.
- Bring teachers and project partners together through online communication channels (Microsoft Teams) and scheduled meetings (online and in-person).
- Advise the Project Leads of any risks arising in a timely manner.

- Minimum two years' experience working with schools and/or teachers or delivering projects in or with educational settings, particularly schools.
- Knowledge of evaluation methodologies and experience in developing reports for different audiences.
- Knowledge of current issues and policy in education.
- Knowledge of emerging approaches to blended CLPL.
- Experience of using Teams, Google Drives, Zoom, Microsoft Word, Microsoft Excel.
- Experience of working with project teams.
- Excellent project management and problem-solving skills, demonstrable experience planning and delivering against deadlines.
- Excellent communication skills (verbal and written).

Desirable skills:

- Coaching skills or experience.

- Knowledge or experience of projects that have delivered anti-racist and intersectional approaches to cultural engagement.
- Knowledge of Health & Safety.
